Health. Social Justice and effectively **Empowerment** in delivering their services in tribal areas of Udaipur and Dungarpur districts.


Unnati has rapidly and effectively strengthened the skills Anganwadi Workers (AWWs), ASHAs, School teachers and PRI members on various issues of education early childhood development, child rights and protection, disability issues, etc. We continue to make significant result for 2019-20. impact in the lives of marginalized Tribal communities with a focus on



programmes around education, disabilities, maternal and child health and nutrition, livelihood opportunities, etc. The trainings and meetings played a key role in building an enabling environment among the members of the community and children. I am hopeful that with the continued support and commitment from all our communities. partners, associates and employees we can bring Unnati's vision to life. I am thankful also to Team Unnati Sansthan the important pillars of organization, who have put their sincere efforts and hard work in communities to achieve the best

Unnati Sansthan is a child focused Non-government Organization (NGO) founded in 2000 by a group of social worker's from Rajasthan with an objective of protecting the rights of the children and creating an enabling environment of social and economic empowerment of rural communities living in India, with a primary focus on tribal children, women and other marginalized groups in the society.

To create a self-reliant organization for bringing about over-all development of the people so that they can take the responsibility of their own and their community development




To organize people, increase their level of awareness and capacity, so that people participate in decision-making process and exercise their Rights to control over their lives and natural resources through collective Actions

- Built capacities of AWWs and ASHAs by participating in more than 100 ICDS sector meetings and 50 Health sector meetings through role plays, interactive sessions, audiovideo tools, etc.
- Trained ICDS Supervisors on their roles in improving service delivery of ASHAs and AWWs by maximum utilization of the platform of sector meetings
- Improved service delivery by providing handholding support at different platforms- PMSMAs, PAMs, MCHNs, Community Based Events (esp. Garbhawastha Paramarsh Diwas, Annaprashan Diwas, Suposhan Diwas)

- Ensured delivery of IFA tablets to children from 6-18
 years by visiting 142 schools and conducting sessions on
 importance of iron for body, foods rich in iron, ill-effects
 of iron deficiency, etc.
- Encouraged PRIs through meetings and training which helped in improving their participation in MCHN sessions.
- Provided training to workers of 25 AWCs equipping them
 with effective communication skills, maintenance of
 necessary records, taking correct anthropometric
 measurements, etc. These have been selected as model
 for further developing them as learning centres
- Provided supportive supervision to FLFs in identifying SAM and MAM children and counseling their families for their immediate care
- Highlighted the role of community influencers in improving children's growth by conducting joint visits along with AWW, ASHA, ANM, PHC Doctor and Sarpanch where families of SAM children were not cooperating in sending their child to MTC



ACHIEVEMENTS

- 72% workers have started counseling families focusing on development of the child from the womb
- 51.5% workers have understood and initiated talks on hunger cues
- 35% Supervisors have started talking about MCPC in sector meetings and the correct ways of filling the growth monitoring chart
- Participation of PRIs in MCHNs has improved
- Identified, counseled and referred 57 SAM children to MTC Centres as well as community camps organized by District Collector
- Joint field visits by AWW, ASHA, ANM and Sarpanch have been done where families of SAM children were not cooperating in sending their child to MTC
















- Built capacities of AWWs and ASHAs by participating in more than 100 ICDS sector meetings through role plays, interactive sessions, group work, etc.
- Supported NCCDC in development of Responsive Parenting Training Module for AWWs and ASHAs on building their effective communication skills for efficient interaction with the caregivers using Sab Rang kit and other modes.
- Provided ToT to ICDS Supervisors on Parenting Training Module for improving the skills of AWWs and ASHAs at the ground level. They were also capacitated on improving the knowledge of workers on developmental domains of child development.

- Developed 87 AWCs as model and provided handholding support to conduct effective domain-specific learning activities at the centre with the children as per their age and capacitating the AWWs on parents' involvement to foster development among children.
- Caregivers have been oriented on the need and importance of early learning and Responsive Parenting through the medium of regular home visits, community meetings and PAMs
- Unnati staff support and supervise AWWs in facilitating PAM, preparing for the event by sending out invitations and motivating caregivers to attend the meeting.
- Developed videos of AWWs conducting effective PAM, sharing their experience with Sab Rang Kit and caregivers engaging with children at home.
- In sectors where Unnati intervened only through sector meetings most of the AWWs were unaware of the domains and their activities. But with our intervention, AWWs and ASHAs showed significant improvement in understanding developmental domains and accordingly conducting activities with the children at the centre



ACHIEVEMENTS

- Sab Rang kit has been distributed in all the 2107 AWCs of 9 blocks and to 42 Supervisors, 9 CDPOs and 1 DD. All AWWs, ASHAs and Supervisors have received at least one round of training on the usage of the cards with caregivers
- As per baseline assessment conducted by the team in the beginning of the program, only 17% AWWs conducted PAM regularly. But with end-line assessment it has increased to 50%.
- Attendance of parents has increased in PAMs with Unnati's intervention and regular motivation to caregivers in creating learning environment at home. AWWs have initiated preparations before PAM to invite parents by giving invitation letters.

Supported by CBM, Unnati Sansthan has been working alongside children and persons with disabilities with special focus on Inclusive Education and skill development in 3 blocks of Udaipur. Through weekly immunization meetings at the AWC, community meetings, sector meetings, and school visits, Bal melas, Child Cabinets and SMCs in schools, DPOs and Inclusive SHGs, people with disabilities are mainstreamed in the society and encouraged to realize their dignity and promote economic, social and psychological empowerment. 5 model schools and 2 model AWCs have also been developed as inclusive spaces where children with disabilities are encouraged to thrive.

- Assessed and identified more than 50 persons with disabilities and assisted them in developing disabilities certificate.
- 61 children with disabilities were supported in receiving assisstive devices and more than 100 persons with disabilities have been associated with social security schemes like disability pension, escort allowance, palanhar, bus pass, etc.
- Through regular participation in immunization day at the AWC, mothers were apprised about the vulnerability of disabilities among children in first 18 months, importance of immunization and early detection and referral of children if disabilities occur.

- Assessed children with disabilities at the AWC through domain-specific developmental activities.
- Visited 75 schools; strengthened children's clubs to encourage students in providing peer support to children with disabilities; strengthening SMCs to promote inclusive school environment; participated in Bal Sabhas to encourage enrollment and retention
- Conducted 3 inclusive Bal Melas and sports program to promote participation of children with disabilities in extra-curricular activities.
- Motivated PRIs through participation in Gram Sabhas for encouraging schemes related to persons with disabilities.
- Formed 9 DPOs at Panchayat level and a district level DPO "Dipes" in order to empower people with disabilities, encourage ownership and enable them in making their voices heard.
- Inclusive and exclusive SHGs have been formed with members consisting of persons with disabilities and caregivers of children with disabilities with an objective to provide financial independency. The SHGs were oriented on disability rights and empowerment and are being led by their own members.
- Developed parents' groups in each block motivating them to support their children with disabilities for the child's growth.
- Life skills training have been organized by Unnati on farming activities and people with disabilities have also been sent to other vocational training programs as well.
- Developed model inclusive schools and AWCs where inclusivity has been promoted through wall painting, sensory toys provided to AWCs, schools provided with working models for simplification of science and math model and sports material given for promoting extra-curricular activities.



ACHIEVEMENTS

- With the help of Sab Rang kit, 6 children have been identified with disabilities at the AWCs.
- DPOs have helped in building ownership among people with disabilities and with the help of Unnati they have learned to advocate for their rights
- Through 15 SHGs, members raised Rs.172,700 and helped each other by providing loans.
- 13 people with disabilities received loans from banks to initiate livelihoods and support their families fueling their self confidence.
- Unnati advocated with schools to provide admission to the children who were denied admission by school authority on the grounds of disabilities which empowered their parents to support the children rather than thinking them as a burden.











SIGHT SAVERS•




In order to address the primary eye health needs of truckers in India, the Sight Savers is working in partnership with Unnati on the program which is funded by RayBan Sun Optics Pvt.Ltd. Under the eye health program, a Vision Center has been set up where the truckers and cleaners receive free eye checkups. Camps are organized every Saturday at places where the commute of truckers is high.

The truckers' program has been envisioned in such a way that it can be reached out to the maximum number of beneficiaries in the most cost-effective way thereby ensuring that such primary care services are not only sound in quality but are also rooted across locations that are easily assessable to the target communities

ACHIEVEMENTS


- 6582 OPDs have been conducted throughout the project period out of which 3441 were screened in VC and 3141 were screened in Camps.
- 48 Camps have been conducted throughout the year.
- 96.6% of the people screened were truckers
- Helped in accumulating data of 6506 truckers which will further help in developing social security schemes for them.

- Learning counting with the help of pebbles
- Understanding about the shapes and sizes of materials with the help of common vegetables
- During lunch, encouraging the habit of sharing and learning how to properly eat without littering around
- Activities to promote hygiene habits among kids at Balwadi as well as while at home

- With the help of puzzles teaching the children the skills of problem solving
- During the playtime teaching them to stand in queues and wait for their turns
- Story telling sessions
- Daily physical exercises

ACHIEVEMENTS

- Built sound foundations for children in the area where government run AWCs are not present
- Ensured all round development of the child which includes physical, language, cognitive, creative and socioemotional development
- Promoted early childhood education through play-way methods and to develop the school-going habit among children
- Sensitized the parents and caregivers about the importance of responsive parenting and engaging children at home for rapid development of children
